Member News

Ian Rowen (Nanyang Technological University) started as Assistant Professor and founding faculty member of the new Geography Programme at Nanyang Technological University in Singapore.

Cindy Fan (UCLA) recently gave two keynotes at the University of Free State in South Africa and at the University of the Philippines. She also gave guest lectures at the London School of Economics, University College London, Chinese University of Hong Kong, UC Berkeley, and City Club of Los Angeles. She published a New York Times commentary on "The One-China Policy Benefits China, Taiwan and the U.S" after President Trump's phone call with President Tsai, and she was a guest on China Radio International's show on aging in China. Professor Fan has an article recently published in Papers in Regional Science and a chapter forthcoming in The SAGE Handbook of Contemporary China. As Vice Provost, she has led or organized UCLA senior administrators' visits to Beijing, Seoul, Tokyo, London, Bloemfontein, and Havana. She is Co-Chair of the International Policy Advisory Committee for the Association of Pacific Rim Universities (APRU) and an External Reviewer for the Higher Education Evaluation Center of China's Ministry of Education. She received Distinguished Service Award of AAG Asian Geography Specialty Group in 2017.

Youqin Huang (Albany) has been appointed as the Executive Director of the Confucius Institute for China's Culture and the Economy (CICCE) at SUNY Albany since August, 2016. She has been working hard to promote the learning of Chinese culture and economy through various educational, academic and cultural events. In addition to monthly speaker series, she is organizing an international conference on "the Transformation and Impact of the Chinese Urban Economy" (April 3-4, 2017), with Southwestern University of Finance and Economics, and Urban China Research Network. (See attached flyer). Invited speakers from different disciplines and regions will come together to discuss recent socio-economic changes in China. Dr. Huang taught "Urban Development in China" at Renmin University in the summer of 2016, and conducted fieldwork on migrants' housing mobility in Beijing. She and Dr. Shenjin He are organizing two sessions on "formal and informal dynamics of affordable housing development" (Sunday 4/9 morning) at the AAG meeting.

Ron Knapp (SUNY New Paltz) carried out field research in western Yunnan in December, the penultimate effort for his forthcoming book China's Covered Bridges: Architecture over Water. While in China, he presented a paper "Chinese Immigrant Homes in Southeast Asia & Residences for a Glorious Retirement in China" at the International Symposium on Cultural Heritage for Wooden Architecture in Ningbo. In April 2016, he presented a paper "In Search of China's Vernacular Heritage" at a Tsinghua University conference in Beijing on Architectural Heritage and Village Studies in the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Mount Wutai.

Aveline Natacha (University of Paris) will organize a symposium as part of the EU-funded MEDIUM project (New pathways for sustainable development in China's medium-sized cities) on June 17-18 at Sun Yat Sen University, Guangzhou campus. It brings together speakers from China and Europe to cross views on various issues relating to urban development, with a (non exclusive) focus on medium-sized cities. The panels may include: urban governance (China-Europe); medium-sized cities defined by complex networks analysis (China/Europe), aging and housing (China/Europe), migration and urban integration (China's medium-sized cities), spatio-temporal behavior and smart cities (China), sustainable development (China), and a panel discussion on stakeholders' democracy (China/Europe) summarizing the salient elements of the stakeholder workshops in Hangzhou and Zhuhai conducted as part of the MEDIUM project.

Tim Oakes (U of Colorado) is currently enjoying a sabbatical as Visiting Professor at the Hong Kong Institute for Humanities and Social Sciences. A couple of his guest-edited collections will be published this Spring. One is in the Journal of Asian Studies, titled 'Catastrophic Asia', and features a commentary by geographer Emily Yeh as well as a paper on Asian water security by a team of Colorado-based hydrologists, along with other essays on Asian catastrophes by atmospheric physicists and anthropologists. The other collection will be published in the International Journal of Communication, titled 'Mediating Asia', and featuring essays on state-media relations in Asia (with a focus on China) by journalists, historians, and media studies scholars. A third guest-edited collection, on cultural governance in urban China, is forthcoming in Environment and Planning A.

Xinyue Ye (Kent State) served as Co-Chair of 8th International Symposium of Spatially Integrated Social Science and Humanities in Nanjing, Program Chair & Proceeding Publication Co-Chair (EI) for 25rd International Conference on Geoinformatics in Buffalo, and Co-Chair of International Conference on Geo-informatics in Sustainable Ecosystem and Society in Wuhan. He also started Visiting Professorship at Center for Geographical Analysis/Institute for Quantitative Social Science, Harvard University (Collaborating Faculty: Robert J. Sampson).

Books

Uitto, Juha I., Jyotsna Puri and Rob D. van den Berg, eds. (2017). Evaluating Climate Change Action for Sustainable Development. Springer.

This authoritative book presents the ever progressing state of the art in evaluating climate change strategies and action. It includes perspectives from independent evaluations of the major international organizations supporting climate action in developing countries, such as the Global Environment Facility. The first section of the book sets the stage and provides an overview of independent evaluations, carried out by multilateral development banks and development organizations. Important topics include how policies and organizations aim to achieve impact and how this is measured, whether climate change is mainstreamed into other development programs, and whether operations are meeting the urgency of climate change challenges. The following sections focus on evaluation of climate change projects and policies as they link to development, from the perspective of international organizations, NGOs, multilateral and bilateral aid agencies, and academia. The authors share methodologies or approaches used to better understand problems and assess interventions, strategies and policies. They also share challenges encountered, what was done to solve these and lessons learned from evaluations. Collectively, the authors illustrate the importance of evaluation in providing evidence to guide policy change to informed decision-making.

c. The AAG will start its own best student paper competition in the 2017 annual meeting. Students affiliated with the CGSG are also encouraged to participate in the AAG paper competition. The prize is US\$1000. d. The AAG is also interested in having a fellow program.

Question from Cindy Fan: The CGSG discouraged students to submit their paper to more than one specialty group. What kind of rule is set up for paper competition?

David Edginton: there is no concrete rule so far. I didn't say that students are forbidden to submitting to the SGSG as well as to the AAG for a bigger price.

Update on membership, finance, AAG business and achievements

Student travel awards went to Ningning Chen, Department of Geography, National University of Singapore for the paper entitled: "Governing rural culture: Agency, space and the re-production of ancestral temples in rural Wenzhou, southeast China"; Luyi Tong, Department of Land Resources and Management, China University of Geosciences, for the paper entitled "Multi-order Urban Development model and sprawl patterns: A multi-scale analysis in China, 2000-2010"

Stanley Toops (Miami University) received the CGSG Outstanding Service Award.

3. Nomination of SG secretary

Towards a Spatial Analysis of China, Present and Past

Speaker: Peter K. Bol, Carswell Professor of East Asian Languages Civilization, Vice Provost for Advances in Learning, Harvard University
