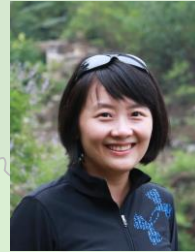

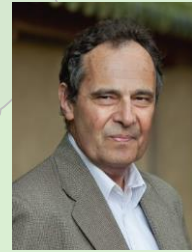

At 5PM, join us for a highly relevant Current Events Roundtable discussion on The Occupy Central/Umbrella Movement in Hong Kong.

**Day 4 Friday:** Feel the exhaust already? There are equally exciting sessions on Friday. Friday begins with a five-session series on Spatial Inequality in China and other regions. In the meantime, you can learn some of the most recent study results from a few sessions on climate change and physical geography in China. Friday also features a Socio-Environmental Justice and Unjust Sustainability session and panel, the latter discussed by Kenneth Pomeranz, our second plenary speaker. **At 5:20PM**, Kenneth Pomeranz will give the **China Geography SG plenary series II** talk on Land Rights, Water Control, and Community Structure in China's Long-Run Development. And, our very popular **China Specialty Group dinner** is scheduled at Lao Szechuan Restaurant Downtown **Friday night!** You can join members to walk to the restaurant after the plenary talk. Details are included in this newsletter, and will also be announced via the listserv as well as at the business meeting.

## China Specialty Group Plenary Series at the 2015 AAG Meeting, Chicago

### Re-visiting the Property State: the Cultural Relations of Homeownership in Singapore, Hong Kong, China, and beyond

Speaker: David Ley, Canada Research Chair in Geography, University of British Columbia



In 2000, Anne Haila introduced the concept of property states, naming Singapore and Hong Kong. In property states land development is prominent in economic growth, the state is a major landowner, and large development corporations hold significant economic and political power. This paper revives the concept and extends it from political economy to everyday life, for the meaning of property ownership is embedded in robust local cultures. In Singapore near universal homeownership in government housing estates provides a coherent nexus of relations for national identity and for the state's social engineering. In Hong Kong, government-controlled land scarcity produces cyclic price inflation, providing a path to middle-class status for apartment owners. But in a volatile market, property can also produce conflict as owners suffering from negative equity after the protracted collapse of residential prices in 1997 looked askance at the continuing profits of tycoons, and their affinity with political elites.

Beyond Singapore and Hong Kong, is China a property state, with its immense development corporations, extraordinary property investment, and huge household debts to secure a highly vaunted but increasingly unaffordable apartment? And what about other nations where recent asset bubbles have undercut builders, bankers, and homeowners? Beneath this chaos, there is a wider cultural predisposition to residential property in neoliberal times, where the desire for homeownership has transitioned to commodification of the home, and anxious wealth/debt calculations.

### Land Rights, Water Control, and Community Structure in China's Long-run Development: 1400AD to now

Speaker: Kenneth Pomeranz, University Professor of Modern Chinese History and in the College, University of Chicago



When viewed in comparative perspective, among the most striking features of late imperial China (ca. 1400-1912) is the combination of a highly commercialized society with the strength of peasant land use rights, and a very small share of the population dependent on wage-earning. I begin by analyzing some reasons for this pattern emphasizing the intersection of customary land rights, the social and environmental challenges of water management, and distinctive systems of family formation and fertility management in China's wealthiest regions. Most of the lecture then traces the long-run consequences of the resulting system, for urbanization, internal trade, migration, environmental change, and fiscal policy. It shows how the intersection of these institutions with China's resource endowments created a distinct political economy which produced considerable agricultural and commercial dynamism, but not industrialization. It then shows that, though severely disrupted in the 19th and early 20th century, patterns derived from these basic conditions continued to shape Chinese economic development thereafter, and even into the present era of post-Mao reform.

**Natacha Aveline** (CNRS-Université Paris 1-Panthéon Sorbonne) has been recently granted two new research grants: 1) PI of the project MEDIUM funded by the program EuropeAid (EU). Entitled "New pathways for sustainable urban development in China's medium-sized cities", the MEDIUM project seeks to address the institutional and socio-economic issues of urban sustainability in China's medium-sized cities, building on the assumption that these dimensions are an integral part of the 'green' scientific challenge. The project is led by the French National Research Center/university Paris I Panthéon-Sorbonne (Géographie-Cités), in partnership with Hangzhou Normal University (The Institute for Urban Studies), Science Po Aix, University Ca' Foscari Venezia, Neuchâtel and Lausanne universities. 2) WP leader of the ODESSA project, funded by the Euro-China UPC. As part of the ODESSA project ("Optimizing care Delivery models to Support Ageing-in-place: towards autonomy, affordability and financial sustainability") WP5 aims at exploring innovative financial channels that provide serviced-homes (healthcare REITs of PE) or secure ageing-in-place (viager/reverse mortgage). The project is led by university Paris-Dauphine and involves university Tsinghua (Institute of Real Estate Studies), CNRS/university Paris I (Géographie-Cités), university Central Lancashire (UK). Furthermore, as part of the FINURBASIE project (funded by the French National Agency) I am co-organizing a India-China conference at the French Institute of Pondicherry in July 16-17 ("Urban land and property dynamics : India and China perspectives').

**David W. Edgington** (University of British Columbia) conducted field research in Shanghai during November-December last year. He conducted interviews with Panasonic's Lifestyle Research Institute, as well as the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

**Cindy Fan** (UCLA) was recently invited to speak at the "China Development Forum" of the London School of Economics and at a Presidential Panel for the "International Education Business Summit" organized by City Club Los Angeles. She also joined Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti's first Asia Trade Mission and led a UCLA delegation to India. Cindy attended the Boao Forum in Hainan where President Xi Jinping will give a keynote, speak at the University of California Education Abroad Program's 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary in Hong Kong, participate in a Deans/Provosts Roundtable at the Annual Meeting of the Language Flagship in Oklahoma, and attend the Doha Forum in Qatar.

**Rudi Hartman** (University of Colorado, Denver) and **Jing'ai Wang** (Beijing Normal University) will participate in the 2015 National Conference on Geography Education in Washington, D.C. August 6 -9, 2015 hosted by the National Council of Geographic Education. They will respectively present papers titled "A Comparative Geography of China and the U.S." and "Facing Globalization: General Education Course Construction Image for *A Comparative Geography of China and the U.S.*". Rudi and Professor **Dietrich Soye** (Geographisches Institut der Universität zu Köln) are

organizers of a special session "Tourism to Destinations with a Controversial Past: issues and Problems in the Management of Dark Heritage Sites" at the CAG (Canadian Association of Geographers) Conference in Vancouver, B.C., June 1 – 5, 2015.

**Qihao Weng** (Indiana State University) has been selected to receive the **2015 AAG Willard and Ruby S. Miller Award**. "Dr. Weng's outstanding record of teaching and research encapsulates the award's intent to honor Association members who have made truly outstanding contributions to the geographic field due to their special competence in teaching or research. As Professor of Geography at Indiana State University, Dr. Weng has made significant and pioneering contributions in the field of urban remote sensing. 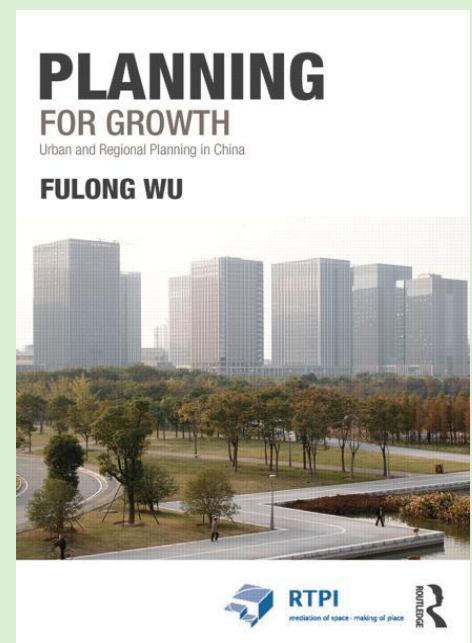
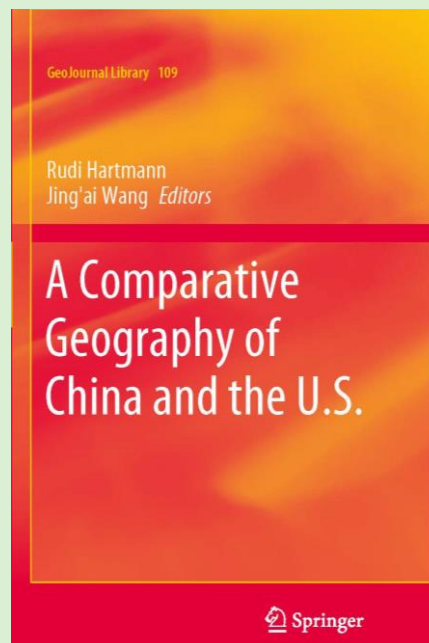
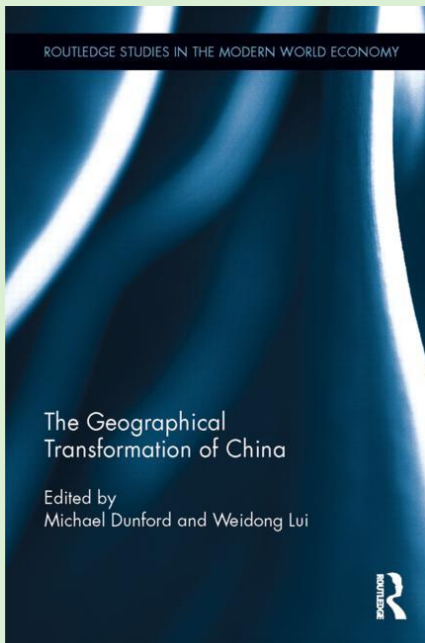

## Books

**Dunford, Michael**, and **Weidong Liu** (eds.). 2014. *The Geographical Transformation of China*. Routledge, 372 pp.

The aim of this book is to present an account and interpretation of the transformation of the geography of China in the years since the start of China's policy of reform and opening-up as seen through the eyes of Chinese geographers. It deals in a systematic way mainly with aspects of the socioeconomic geography of China's transformation including its changing relations with the rest of the world. Chapters 1 and 2 deal, respectively, with the economic and the political and cultural foundations of the Chinese development model. Subsequent chapters examine respectively the evolution of regional disparities, rural change, manufacturing, urbanization, the provision of rural public services, urban housing, the floating population, transport and ecosystem change.

Fulong Wu. 2015. *Planning for Growth: Urban and Regional Planning in China*. Routledge, 252pp.

In contrast to the popular imagination of being procedural or even the 'enemy of business' under neoliberal attack in the West, planning in China was resurrected after economic reform and is becoming a key driver for fast urbanization and economic growth. This book traces the origin of Chinese modern planning in the Republican and Socialist eras and offers an accessible text on its complicated planning system. Broadly speaking, planning activities in China include three different types, respectively under the directory of construction, land administration, and development and reform commissions. This complicated institutional set-up reflects the tension between promoting growth and implementing development control. The book provides three explanations for why the Chinese planning profession has experienced a boom during market transition. First, planning has been commoditized and has adapted well to market development; second, planning has been transformed to cope with the crisis brought about by marketization; and third, planning has created legitimacy for growth and strengthened the role of the state during market transition, which has in turn enhanced its own position. The legacies of planning as modernization and development visualization laid down the foundation of a proactive planning approach. The book examines planning practices under urban entrepreneurialism and recent attempts to coordinate development through national and regional planning. Fascinating examples of new towns and eco-cities planning are illustrated with a close look at their planning and development processes. The book gives a historical and panoramic overview of developments and changes in urban and regional planning in China. With a 'comparative gesture,' it complements its classic counterpart on Western Europe and North America.

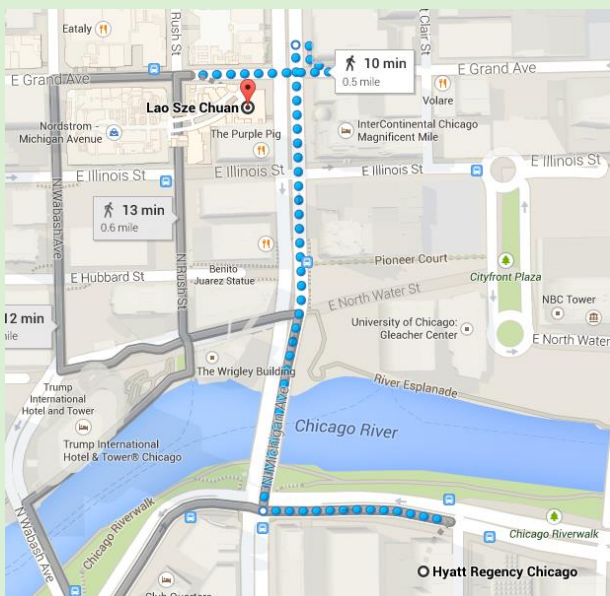

## CSG Officers 2014-2015

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Obituary  
**CHIAO-MIN HSIEH**



Professor Emeritus of Geography at the University of Pittsburgh passed away February 26, 2015, in Silver Spring, Maryland. He was 96 years old. Born in Shaoxing, Zhejiang province, in China, Chiao-min, the youngest of four children, was a proud graduate of Zhejiang University in 1941. He arrived in the United States in the late 1940s with his wife, the late Jean Kan Hsieh, to pursue his doctoral studies in geography at Syracuse University. Chiao-min received his PhD in 1953. Unable to return to his homeland in the tumultuous 1950s, Chiao-min ultimately became a U.S. citizen and a world-wide traveler. Throughout his long distinguished career, Chiao-min taught at numerous universities, including Dartmouth College, University of Leeds, Catholic University, Hong Kong University, National Taiwan Normal University, the Chinese Culture University, and his alma mater, Zhejiang University. He was awarded a Fulbright Research Professorship three times and was a senior fellow for National Endowment for the Humanities. He joined the faculty of the University of Pittsburgh in 1969, ultimately retiring from there in 1992. Chiao-min authored numerous scholarly books and atlases including: "China: Ageless Land and Countless People" (1967), "Taiwan Ilha Formosa: a Geography in Perspective" (1964), "Atlas of China" (1973), "Changing China: a Geographic Appraisal" (with Max Lu) (2003), and "China, a Provincial Atlas" (with Jean Kan Hsieh) (1995). His last book, "Race the Rising Sun" (2009) was a personal account, co-authored with his wife, Jean. The book describes their Zhejiang University years and the university's evacuation from the Japanese occupation of Hangzhou during the Second Sino-Japanese War. A learned, proud, competitive and determined man during his lifetime, Chiao-min was a passionate Chinese chess (xiangqi) player and a keen follower of basketball, especially of the University of Pittsburgh team. Loving husband of his wife of 65 years, who passed away in 2012, and his two children who survive him, daughter, Eileen Hsieh (Michael Tomenga); and son, An-Ping Hsieh (Sarah Lessels Hsieh). He had a genuine love and soft spot for, and was proudest of, his five grandchildren, Brian, Andrew and Kyra Tomenga, and Jessica and Alexander Hsieh. No memorial services will be held.
