2023 CGSG Outstanding Service Award

CGSG is very pleased to announce **Professor Tim Oakes** as the recipient of the CGSG Outstanding Service Award during the 2023 Annual AAG Meeting.

Prof. Oakes is Professor of Geography and former Director of the Center for Asian Studies at the University of Colorado at Boulder. He is also Project Director of the <u>China Made Project</u>, funded by the Henry Luce Foundation.



Professor Oakes' globally-recognized scholarship has significantly advanced our understanding of ongoing social and cultural transformation in contemporary China. Moreover, his longstanding service to geography and China studies (including as CGSG chair from 2013-14) has strengthened the geographical study of China and built CGSG into an organization with a broader reach.

2023 CGSG Annual Student Paper Awards

CGSG Best Student Paper

The Best Student Paper Award went to **Xiaoling Chen**, University of Colorado Boulder, for the paper entitled "The Venue Code: Digital Surveillance, Spatial (Re)organization, and Infrastructural Power during the Covid Pandemic in China."

CGSG Student Paper Runner-up and Travel Award

The CGSG Student Travel Award went to **Yiou Zhang**, UCLA, for the paper entitled "The Geography, Scaling and Diffusion of Recombinant Knowledge across Chinese Cities, 1991-2015." The Student Travel Award is offered to the runner-up in the paper competition.

CGSG STUDENT PAPER AWARDS FOR AAG 2024

The China Geography Specialty Group sponsors an annual award to recognize excellent student research and paper presentations in a CGSG-sponsored session, including at the next annual AAG conference in Honolulu, Hawai'i from April 16-20, 2024.

Eligibility:

Student members of the CGSG at all academic levels (undergraduates or graduate students) are qualified. The student must be the sole author and presenter of the paper. Multiple submission to more than one specialty groups for Student Paper Award is NOT allowed. Papers being considered by other AAG Specialty Group for student Paper Award are not qualified for the CGSG Student Paper Award. Participants must have submitted the abstract and appropriate program participation fee to the AAG for participation at the AAG Annual Meeting in Honolulu, April 16-20, 2024.

Award:

A \$250 prize will be awarded for the best paper, in addition to an award certificate and prepaid lunch at the AAG Awards Banquet. Two Travel Awards of \$100 each will go to the First and Second Runner-up. A committee of faculty from the China Geography Specialty Group will evaluate the papers. Evaluation criteria for the award include the originality of the research, the soundness and creativity of the research design and methodology; the validity of conclusions; and quality of the presentation. The award will be announced at the Business Meeting of the China Geography Specialty Group in Honolulu in April 2024, and published in the CGSG and AAG newsletters.

Guidelines for Submission:

To be considered for the competition, authors should e-mail a copy of the paper's title and abstract to the CGSG Chair by **February 1st, 2024**. Please include author's name, academic level (undergraduate, master's or doctoral), academic institution, department or program, current address, phone number, and EMAIL. An electronic version of the paper, in Word format, must reach the Chair no later than **March 1st, 2024**.

Kam Wing Chan (University of Washington, Seattle) resumed in-person academic travels in September after a four-year hiatus. He visited King's College in London, and gave a talk on China's hukou reform at Princeton. He has also penned several public posts on Weixin on that subject (refer to his website here). Most important of all, his Chinese book on China's urbanization and hukou system, after many years of hard work, was finally published this summer. Five other recent / forthcoming publications are listed in Member Publications.



Ding Fei (Cornell University) published articles in the *Journal of International Development, Eurasian Geography & Economics*, and the *Journal of Contemporary China*.

Cindy Fan (UCLA) published a book chapter "Split Households and Migration in the Global South: Gender and Intergenerational Perspectives" and two book reviews. She was interviewed by Chengdu Radio & Television and by *Nikkei Asia*, and she gave presentations or commentaries in Warsaw, Changsha (virtual), Singapore, Boston and Denver. She is one of the five leads of UCLA's Strategic Plan.



Yue Gong (Wuhan University) published articles in *Cities* and *Population, Space and Place,* and a book review in the *Journal of Urban Affairs*.



Tyler Harlan (Loyola Marymount University) was promoted to associate professor in June. He also received the Loyola Marymount Univ. Ascending Scholar Award, Outstanding Advisor Award, and Global Engagement Vision Award. From 2023-24, he is a visiting research fellow with the Centre for Contemporary Chinese Studies at The Univ. of Melbourne.



Youqin Huang (University at Albany) published articles in the *Journal of Happiness Studies*, *Applied Geography*, the *Journal of Exposure Science and Environmental Epidemiology*, and *IJURR*.





Anthony Howell (Arizona State University) was appointed co-director of the Center for Technology, Data, and Society, commencing in Fall 2023. He received funding from ASU Institute of Social Science to develop an AI-interviewer built on ChatGPT to collect qualitative interview data at scale, piloted on microentrepreneurs participating virtually in business incubators.



Ron Knapp (SUNY New Paltz) published a 500+ page book in September 2023 with Terry E. Miller as coauthor titled *Theodore Burr and the Bridging of Early America: The Man, Fellow Bridge Builders, and Their Forgotten Bridges*. Prof. Knapp has researched China's social and cultural geography since 1965, rarely missing a year of fieldwork, with his last visit in Fall 2019 to launch his co-authored book *China's Covered Bridges: Architecture over Water*.



Kean Fan Lim (Newcastle University) commenced his appointment as Editor of *Antipode* in May 2023. He also published articles in *Environment and Planning A* and *IJURR*. The latter paper drew on historical materials collected during Prof. Lim's PhD 10 years ago—a good reminder to not let data go to waste!



Tim Oakes (University of Colorado, Boulder) led the publication of a special section of China Made project articles in *The China Quarterly* (v. 255) on "Chinese Infrastructure: techno-politics, materialities, legacies," with contributions from several CGSG members. With support from the CU Boulder Center for Asian Studies, he also convened a third workshop in the "Tale of Two Asias" project on "living in and beyond the nuclear age in Asia" on October 27th.

Xiaoping Shen (Central Connecticut State University) served as the Founding Coordinator of the Asian American and Pacific Islander Studies minor program and the Committee of the Asian American and Pacific Islander Studies at Central Connecticut State University from 2021 to 2023. Prof. Shen also co-authored a book with Springer Nature and an article with *Annals of the AAG* in 2022.



Wang Kun (Guangzhou Institute of Geography) received a 300k RMB grant from the National Natural Science Foundation of China. His co-authored article on "Global Destruction Networks" received the prestigious Ashby Prize from *Environment and Planning A* for the most innovative paper of 2022—the first time the prize was awarded to scholars from mainland China and Hong Kong. He was also listed as one of six outstanding junior scholars by the Urban China Research Network.



Yehua Dennis Wei (University of Utah) published articles in the *Journal of Urban Planning and Development, Professional Geographer, Geographical Review, Travel Behaviour and Society,* and *Humanities and Social Sciences Communications.*



Max Woodworth (Ohio State University) has recently begun a three-year NSF Research Coordination Network grant titled "Coordinating Global Coal Transition Research" with his portion focused on coal issues in China. The grant will last through 2025.
